Yvonne will be accompanied by musicians and these informal gatherings will be open to all.

Corrandula Library Event:

Friday 15th April 2011, 7:30pm

A group of volunteers have built a library in the village of Corrandulla entirely on their own without funding from any entity or organisation. These women wanted to remember their dear friend Sally Hardiman who died in 2009 after a very short and tragic battle with cancer. Sally ran the local pub and was a very popular personality in the community: she also loved books. Together with their husbands, their children and willing electricians, plumbers and helpers, they opened the Library of Friends in December 2010. Already having over 1000 members, the library has become a focal point in the community and has given Sally a lasting legacy. In order to celebrate this amazing community spirit and love for books we have scheduled an event here during Cúirt. Special guest Patricia Scanlan will give a reading of her work at the library. This will be followed by a book signing, music and a reception afterwards in the community hall.

One Book One Town, Tuam

This year we are linking in with the One Book, One Town project in Tuam (which is modelled on the worldwide One Book One City initiative). Schools in the town read a book from January to May each year and do various activities set around the text. Last year they read *Cirque de Freak* by Darren Shan and performed a flash dance in the town square which was choreographed by a local modern dance teacher. This year the chosen book is, *The Secret of Kells*, an adaptation by Eithne Massey of the animated Oscar nominated animation. Local celebrity Midi Corcoran from Earwig Festival will read some chapters of the book in the library on Thursday 14th and Friday 15th April. All are welcome.

Musical Storytollina

We are also bringing a musical bilingual storytelling event out to Connemara. The event will take place in Carraroe Library where 5 local schools (many based on the islands) who have never been to a Cüirt event before will get the opportunity to attend. Clarinetist Paul Roe and Actress Nuala Hayes present a compelling and entertaining programme of music and words. This intriguing concert features a new Irish language version of Bedtime Stories for clarinetist and narrator (translated by Ray Yeates) by iconic American composer Tom Johnson. Paired with this is some delightful work by Irish Composer Christopher Norby based on a series of short stories by Tim Burton. Local storyteller Máirín Mhic Lochlainn will also perform a 15minute storytelling session which will bring the event to a close.

Reachtairí na Cúirte

A flying column of poetry reciters and music makers taking their inspiration from the reachtaire of old; the troupe (two male, two female actors and a musician) will perform poems and some prose around the city during the festival. They will give performances on the street, in The Latin Quarter and at our Festival Club. These performances will be based on writing native to and about Galway.

Road Mo I'm Yours

Read Me I'm Yours is a new activity at Cúirt this year. A number of copies of visiting authors books will be dropped in various locations around the city where people can pick them up and read them. They will have a sticker or a flyer inside that gives the date and time of the authors reading so that those intrigued by what they read can go along to the event. These books will be left at cafés, pubs and hotel foyers.

Fighting Words

Fighting Words is a creative writing centre, established by Roddy Doyle and Sean Love. Inspired by 826 Valencia in San Francisco Fighting Words is located on Behan Square, Russell Street, Dublin 1, very close to Croke Park. Fighting Words helps students of all ages to develop their writing skills and to explore their love of writing. They provide story-telling fieldtrips for primary school groups, creative writing workshops for secondary students, and seminars, workshops and tutoring for adults. All tutoring is free.

Fighting Words at Cuirt 2011:

Fighting Words will run two workshops during Cúirt with primary school students during which the classes will write a book. Helped by Fighting Words tutors, they will write a story which is projected onto a big screen. The children decide on the characters and plot, and write the story - sentence by sentence. They will edit, and make corrections as they go. Meanwhile, a volunteer artist draws illustrations to go with the story. The group's element of the writing takes the story about three-quarters of the way through the plot. Then the pages are collated, printed, covered and bound - with several blank pages at the end, so each child can write and illustrate his or her own ending, at school or at home. Each student will leave the workshop with his or her own book.

Sujata Bhatt was born in Ahmedabad, India. She received her MFA from the Writers' Workshop at the University of Iowa. She has published six collection of poems, including: Monkey Shadows (1991) and Augatora (2000), both Poetry Book Society Recommendations; and A Colour for Solitude (2002), which deals exclusively with the life and work of the German painter, Paula Modersohn-Becker. What does it take to become a published writer?
We ask four major publishers of poetry and fiction what advice they can give on writing.

Neil Astley

Neil Astley is editor of Bloodaxe Books, which he founded in 1978 and has edited over a thousand poetry books. His own books include two poetry collections and several anthologies, including *Staying Alive* (2002), *Being Alive* (2004), *Earth Shattering: Ecopoems* (2007) and *Being Human* (2011). He has published two novels, *The End of My Tether* (2002), which was shortlisted for the Whitbread First Novel Award, and *The Sheep Who Changed the World (2005)*.

Jessie Lendennie

Jessie Lendennie is the Managing Director of Salmon Publishing, one of Ireland's leading literary publishers. She was born in Arkansas, USA and educated at King's College, London, England.

She was a founding editor of 'The Salmon International Literary Journal' (1982) and co-founder of Salmon Publishing, 1985. Since 1986 she has run the press at its editor and Managing Director; commissioning, editing and publishing over 200 books; many of which were first collections from Irish women writers; a groundbreaking move in Irish poetry.

Brendan Barrington

Brendan Barrington was born in New York and has lived in Ireland since 1995. He was an editor for Lilliput Press and is also the founder, editor and publisher of *The Dublin Review*. He is now a senior editor at Penguin Ireland.

Alex Bowler

Alex Bowler is Senior Editor at Jonathan Cape, where he has worked for the past five years. He has edited the work of Martin Amis, Julian Barnes and Ian McEwan. His recent commissions include Kevin Barry's CITY OF BOHANE and the Booker-shortlisted novel C by Tom McCarthy.

For eight years he has taught a course on creative writing at the Master in Science communication of the International School for Advanced Studies in Trieste. He has translated many books from English and German into Italian, and is an active scientific popularizer and lecturer.



John Beag O'Flatharta

John Beag O'Flatharta, "an tAncaire" is from Foirnis, Leitir Meallain on Connemara's island coast, perhaps an unlikely enviroment for a successful country and western performer - Irish style. He has taken the irish speaking world by storm with his catchy rhythms and memorable songs from a local tradition yet sung to airs more akin tp American mid -west style. Creating a niche for himself and others singing country music in irish and ballads in English, John Beag has had immediate success. Immersed in local traditional singing, initially sean-nos (unaccompanied) he has brought a freshness to performing in his own special way, country and western - "tir agus thiar" - his genre as a mode of expression.

Currently, he is Bourne Professor of Poetry and director of the McEver Visiting Writers program at the Georgia Institute of Technology.


Eif Batuman

Born in Glasgow to Sligo parents, Lorna Siggins was educated in the Scottish city as well as in Kildare and Dublin. She studied Arts at Trinity College Dublin before teaching in the Middle East for a year. Beginning as a freelance journalist with publications such as 'The Irish Skipper', a monthly magazine for the Irish fishing industry, she joined *The Irish Times* in 1988. Her book Once Upon a Time in the West, The Corrib Gas Controversy describes the battle between oil giant Shell and a small Irish farming community over the location of an onshore gas pipeline. Siggins has been covering the controversy from the beginning and no one is better placed to unravel the twists and turns of this fascinating human drama and its political, cultural and environmental shockwaves. In a new Ireland where economic logic goes largely unchallenged, the Corrib Gas pipeline controversy raises uncomfortable questions about the ways in which Ireland has changed. Siggins will read from and discuss her book; there will be an opportunity for a Q&A at the end of the session.



Poet and prose fiction writer Helon Habila studied Literature at the University of Jos and lectured for three years at the Federal Polytechnic, Bauchi, before going to Lagos to write for Hints Magazine. Extracts from his collection of short stories. Prison Stories were published in Nigeria in 2000 The full text was published as a novel in the UK under the title Waiting for an Angel in 2002 and received a Commonwealth Writers Prize (Africa Region, Best First Book) in 2003. If you travel along the No. 1 highway in Nova Scotia, you'll pass through a town called Mt. Uniacke. As you enter the town, you'll see a sign that reads, 'Home Of Buck 65', Buck 65 is the codename of one Ricardo Terfry. He used to wander the dirt roads of Mt. Uniacke wearing an Adidas one-piece wrestling outfit. He thought it gave him hip hop credibility, but he was wrong. The latest addition to Buck 65's awe-inspiring oeuvre is an album called 20 Odd Years, which celebrates the roughly 20 years that he has been making his wicked, weird and wonderful music.






Steve Bloomfield

Louise Doughty was born in 1963 in the East Midlands, UK. She grew up in Rutland, England's smallest county, a rural area that later provided the setting for her third novel, Honey-Dew. She attended Leeds University, where she took a BA in English Literature and the University of East Anglia where she did the famous MA in Creative Writing course with Malcolm Bradbury and Angela Carter.

After graduating from the course, she moved to London and spent the rest of her twenties in a series of temporary jobs including teaching, bar jobs and secretarial work. It was her experiences as a temp secretary that provided the material for her first novel, *Crazy Paving* (1995), a black comedy about accidents, Chaos Theory and urban terrorism. After her first three novels, Doughty took a dramatic departure with her fourth, the internationally acclaimed *Fires in the Dark*, the first in a series of long novels based on the history of the Romany people and her own family ancestry. It was followed by *Stone Cradle* in 2006.Her new novel *Whatever You Love* was shortlisted for the Costa Novel Prize 2010

Valorio Homingway: Public Interview with Vincent Woods



Valerie Hemingway

A chance encounter in Spain in 1959 brought young Irish reporter Valerie Danby-Smith face to face with Ernest Hemingway. The interview was awkward and brief, but before it ended something had clicked into place. For the next two years, she devoted her life to Hemingway and his wife, Mary, traveling with them through beloved old haunts in Spain and France and living with them during the tumultuous final months in Cuba. She helped type and proof A Moveable Feast and The Dangerous Summer. Following the author's death, Valerie worked for the Hemingway Estate in Cuba, Key West, Ketchum, and New York gathering all of the author's papers and organizing them for presentation in the Kennedy Library.

She came by the Hemingway name by marrying and later divorcing Gregory, his youngest son. For two decades she worked in publishing and public relations in New York City, including two years as a fiction reviewer for *Publishers Weekly*. Her articles have appeared in *Saturday Review*, *The New York Times*, and *Smithsonian Magazine*. The late Norman Mailer wrote of Valerie Hemingway's memoir *Running with the Bulls*: "(It) is one of the best books on Hemingway that I have read, and it has material to be found nowhere else on Ernest, Mary, and Greg Hemingway."

Vincent Woods is an award winning playwright and poet. He has won The Stewart Parker Award for Drama, 1993; the PJ O'Connor Award for Radio Drama, and the M.J. McManus Award for Poetry. He currently hosts The Arts Show on RTE Radio 1 and is a member of Aosdána.





Sago Francis

Dubbed as a "forefather of indie-hop," Sage Francis first made a name for himself in the emcee battle circuit during the late 90's and early 2000's while distributing his "Sick of Walting" mixtape series hand-to-hand. In the matter of a few years he graduated from bootlegging his own music to being one of the top selling independent artists in hip-hop, all while sitting at the helm of Strange Famous Records in his home city of Providence, RI. Setting aside the more boastful side of rap, Francis quickly became recognized for the poetic leanings and scathing socio-political commentary in his lyrics. His debut album, Personal Journals, was heralded as both an artistic masterpiece and a genre game changer. The risks taken in his music and business approach, through the course of five commercial album releases, have helped Francis stay a few steps ahead of the game, utilizing various channels of the internet to cut out unnecessary middlemen while the industry burns, burns, burns to the ground.

Norman Villa Gallery, Salthill

Charlie Cullen was born in Longford but has been based in Dublin most of his career. He lectured in the National College of Art and Design, and was eventually appointed Head of Painting. Cullen is a also a member of Aosdána and one of the founders of the Projects Arts Centre.

Recognized as one of the most gifted draughtsman of his generation, he has been greatly influenced by the German Expressionists and the Dada school, <u>especially George</u> Gross and Otto Dix,

Cullen has found Joyce's Ulysses to be a great source of inspiration. His series of etchings based on the novel which feature in this exhibition have widely exhibited and admired.





Eamon O Dohørty

Derry-born Eamonn O'Doherty is a sculptor, painter, print maker and photographer. An architect by training, he has lectured on the subject widely and retired in 2002 to concentrate on his art.

O'Doherty is best known for his large-scale sculptures – some 40 in all in Ireland, Europe and America. His iconic Quincentennial Sculpture in Galway's Eyre Square is an image often used to promote the city.

In 1957, O'Doherty came to Dublin, and acquired a copy of Ulysses a year later. He still finds it impossible to spend a day in the city without a reminder of some scene or episode from the book. The lithographs in this exhibition were made originally for an exhibition in the Peacock Theatre in the early 1980s; the bronze maquette of 'Anna Livia' was the working model for the eponymous sculpture originally on O'Connell Street, but now relocated near Heuston Station. The sculptures Joyce are recent works.



Maraaret Irwin

Born in India to Irish parents and now based in Claddaghduff, Margaret is a painter and printer whose work delves from the rich seams of Irish archaeology and the rituals of everyday life.

Løoniø King

Both a printmaker and painter, Leonie King has travelled extensively from her Oranmore base. Foreign images and colours are brought home and blended with those of the Irish landscape and its patterns, textures and mists.

Doloros Lyna

Originally from south Kerry and now resident in Connemara, Dolores Lyne is primarily a painter who draws her influences from the western parts of Connemara and its islands. Her work finds expression through subtle, toned variations and lyrical landscapes, based on the natural rhythms of land and water.

Jay Murphy

Jay Murphy's landscapes are concerned with form, shape and texture within nature. In both her oils and pastels this is emphasised by the use of a strong vibrant palette, somewhat reminiscent of the Fauvists. Jay Murphy is from Dublin and lives and works in Connemara.

Sioban Piørov

Sioban's work originates in personal experiences and observations that include subject matter as diverse as the domestic garden and the temples at Karnac. Her choice of screenprint as a medium, combined with a subtle pallette of colours results in hauntingly compelling images. Sioban lives and works in Athenry.
