
Festival Launch Who Cares introduced by John Godber

TREASURE HOUSE 5.30-7.30PM £6



The Festival launches in the company of one of the UK's most celebrated playwrights, John Godber, who will introduce the East Riding premiere of his latest commission, Who Cares.

With an ageing population, the pressure is on the carers to step in and comfort those in need, but as the NHS teeters, the Kafka-esque communication systems don't always function as they should. This cautionary tale, written with Gobder's characteristic black humour, is performed by Hull University's legendary Drama Department. It is the first collaboration between Wordquake, the University and the multi-award-winning playwright, John Godber. Who Cares is part of Wordquake's Festival on the Run outreach programme and will be making home visits to libraries and venues in Hull and East Yorkshire from this October.



Thursday 2 October

History & Fiction: Jeremy Page & Alex Preston

BEVERLEY LIBRARY 7-8PM £6



In the first of two events exploring historical fiction, authors Jeremy Page and Alex Preston explore how history can influence fiction and how fiction can make us re-examine history. Both writers use different historical backdrops to explore universal themes—love, relationships, beliefs, obsessions—and offer vivid and intimate insights into history.

Alex Preston was selected as one of Waterstones New Voices 2010. His first novel, This Bleeding City, was an international bestseller, winning the Spear's and Edinburgh first book awards. He writes for the Observer and New Statesman. Described as 'a powerful new voice' (The Independent), Jeremy Page's first novel, Salt, was shortlisted for the Jelf First Novel Award and the Commonwealth Writers' Prize for Best First Book. He has worked as a script editor and writer for FilmFour and the BBC.

Friday 3 October

Kathy Lette — Courting Trouble

Start the weekend with a bang in the company of one of the most brilliant comic writer of contemporary fiction.

Author of 11 international bestsellers, a regular on BBC and Sky television and a passionate advocate of women's rights, Kathy will introduce her latest book, Courting Trouble. With her inimitable, outspoken style and sharp, witty observations, you can be guaranteed an evening of outrageous humour and entertainment.

Having left school at 16, she wrote her first novel, Puberty Blues, at 17 and became an overnight sensation. She cites her career highlights as once teaching Stephen Fry a word, Salmon Rushdie how to limbo and scripting Julian Assange's cameo in the Simpsons 500th episode. Hosted by James Nash.

Tracy Borman —Thomas Cromwell

Historian Tracy Borman returns to the festival to discuss one of the most controversial and talked-about figures in English history, Thomas Cromwell. We all know him from Hilary Mantel's bestselling novels Wolf Hall and Bring up the Bodies, but who was the real Thomas Cromwell?

Henry VIII's right hand man, Thomas Cromwell was one of the most powerful figures in history who changed the shape of England forever. The architect of England's break with the Roman Catholic Church, influential in securing Henry's divorce from Catherine of Aragon, many believe he was also the ruthless force behind Anne Boleyn's downfall and subsequent execution. But where does the truth lie?

Intricate Lives: Dinah Jefferies & Isabel Wolff

TOLL GAVEL UNITED CHURCH 12.30-1.30PM €6

In the second of our events exploring historial fiction, authors Isabel Wolff and Dinah Jefferies discuss the appeal of writing historical fiction and why the past is more appropriate than the present for their writing. Both authors have set their novels in the Far East and have written about periods of history which have received virtually no attention from novelists, exploring in detail family relationships, notably the lengths to which mothers will go to protect their children.

A Sunday Times bestseller, Isabel Wolff's 10 novels have been published in 30 languages. Best known for her romantic comedies, her latest book, *Ghostwritten*, is a dramatic new departure. A former BBC producer, she has written for The Independent, the Daily Telegraph and The Spectator. A book that is already attracting considerable attention, Dinah Jeffries' debut, *The Separation*, draws on her own experience of growing up in the Far East.



James Booth —Philip Larkin: Life, Art and Love

'The first biography which...Larkin might have admitted to reading—and even more unwillingly, enjoying' (Carol Rumens). Philip Larkin was that rare thing among poets: a household name in his own lifetime. Larkin's reputation as a man, however, has been more controversial. A solitary figure, he disliked exposure and had no patience with the literary world. In his frank and

insightful biography, James Booth uses unseen material to redress the balance between the poet's work and his personal life.

Breathing life into Larkin's words, actors from
University of Hull's drama department will read
extracts from Larkin's letters and poems.

A highly respected Larkin scholar, James taught at the University of Hull, where he was a colleague of Larkin for seventeen years. He has edited a number of Larkin's works and published various critical studies. He is literary adviser to the Philip Larkin Society and co-edits its journal, About Larkin.



Crime: Fiction vs Reality Mari Hannah, Anya Lipsky & Mo Dowdy with David Mark



Northumberland-based Mari Hannah has written four novels in the DCI Kate Daniels series. Her debut-The Murder Wall-won the Polari First Book Prize and her second-Settled Blood-won the Northern Writers' Award. Former journalist, Anya Lipska is a TV producer and author whose books give insights into London's Polish community. David Mark spent more than 15 years as a journalist, including seven years as a crime reporter with The Yorkshire Post. His first novel, The Dark Winter, was selected for the Richard and Judy Book Club in 2013.

Sarah is the author of five novels, three of which have been adapted for television. Tipping the Velvet (1998) won the Betty Trask Award. Affinity (1999) won the Somerset Maugham Award and the Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year Award. Fingersmith (2002) won the South Bank Show Award for Literature and the CWA Historical Dagger. She has been shortlisted three times for the Man Booker Prize and twice for the Orange Prize. Hosted by James Nash.



Tore Renberg is a multi-award-winning author, literary critic and TV host. His novel, The Man Who Loved Yngve, became a major film and his subsequent novels have sold over 400,000 copies in Norway. His work has been translated into 19 languages.

Wednesday 8 October

Richard O Smith —The Man with his Head in the Clouds

BEVERLEY LIBRARY 7—8PM £6

This is the story of how an uneducated Oxford pastry cook became the first Englishman to fly, in a self-built balloon powered by primitive - and lethal hydrogen. Despite force 8 gales, crashing into hills, landing in the Irish Sea and being dragged for two miles along the ground near Pontefract, James Sadler became a pioneering aeronaut, earning the respect of Lord Nelson and fans such as Percy Shelley and Dr. Johnson. It is also the story of how the author chose to replicate Sadler's first ever flight, despite suffering from acute acrophobia—a crippling fear of heights.

Comedian Richard O. Smith is the principal screenwriter of this summer's hit movie The Unbeatables (starring Rupert Grint and Rob Brydon). He writes for BBC Radio 4's The Now Show and News Quiz. He is the author As Thick As Thieves documenting criminal ineptitude, an Amazon No. I bestseller in humour.

Imaginatively adapted from Henry James's novel Washington Square and directed by Hollywood film director, William Wyler, The Heiress concerns a shy heiress (Olivia de Havilland), who is courted by a handsome suitor (Montgomery Clift) against the wishes of her stern father (Ralph Richardson). The film won four Oscars, including best actress (de Havilland) and best score (Aaron Copland).

The screening will be introduced by Neil Sinyard, Emeritus Professor of Film Studies at Hull University. Author of 25 books on film, Professor Sinyard's latest publication, A Wonderful Heart: The Films of William Wyler, positions Wyler as the greatest Hollywood director of his day and The Heiress one of his finest films.

Shirley Williams —The Life of Vera Brittain

One of the UK's most respected and senior political figures, Baroness Shirley Williams talks movingly about her mother—Vera Brittain—whose activities helped shape the political landscape in the early years of the 20th Century.

Brittain's pioneering war memoir Testament of Youth still continues to make impact 80 years after it was first published. It was the result of immense tenacity and courage that, at the outbreak of the First World War, Brittain abandoned a hard-fought battle to study at Oxford to volunteer as a nurse in France. While there, she witnessed the horrors and tragedies of war, losing her fiancé, brother and two closest male friends in this 'war to end all wars'. In her outrage and pain she wrote Testament of Youth. It resonates to this day, as does Brittain's assertion that war is an abomination.


